Aquarium with freshwater fish in Café Væksthuset

Now Café Væksthuset is home not only to humans, dogs and plants, but also to fish. Professor Kurt Bauchmann from the Department of Disease Biology has sent the following to eLIFE:

Students taking the course on Aquaculture have not only been active in the laboratory but also in the field. In Café Væksthuset, they have now established a 250 l aquarium with gravel, plants and Danish freshwater fish. You can watch and be impressed by tenches, roaches, bleaks and crucian carp swimming happily around in the aquarium. All the fish come from Danish waters. The project was carried out with the help of a donation (the aquarium) from Denmark Aquarium in Charlottenlund and the hard work of the students. The young aquaculturalists are generally very interested in fish and couldn't resist the temptation to contribute to the atmosphere of Væksthuset with some of the things they hold dear. Thomas Hagner from the café has been kind enough to make space available for the project, and the hope is that it can be expanded in future to also be able to demonstrate sustainable systems and the principles of the aquatic environment. The students are part

of the inter-Nordic collaboration that also includes the MSc in Aquaculture study programme, which has been established under the NOVA University Network.

Danish Royalty visited University Hospital for Large Animals

As part of the official opening of Scandinavia's newest University Hospital for Large Animals, HRH Princess Benedikte visited the large animal hospital on 8 October.

HRH Princess Benedikte is very interested in horses as is her daughter Princess Nathalie zu Sayn-Wittgenstein, who won a bronze medal in dressage at this year's Olympics.

The tour included a simulated operation in one of the ultramodern operating theatres, where 1,000-kg anaesthetised horses are hoisted on to the operating table using specially constructed cranes. They also viewed one of the specially designed examination rooms with a treadmill for horses, where the animals' heart and lung capacity can be assessed while they run a top speed.

Eva Kjer Hansen, Danish Minister for Food, Agriculture and Fisheries, Jørgen Honoré, Director of the University of Copenhagen, and Dean Per Holten-Andersen also took part in the tour. The tour was led by Susanne Nautrup Olsen, clinical manager, while Professor Pia Haubro Fischer presented the operating facilities.

The Horrors of the Gardens

Although the Faculty Gardens is normally delightfully pleasant with its many beautiful flowers, it also has its shady and ominous sides, at least if you take a closer look at the Danish plant names.

Let's start out carefully with the 'animals' where we have the well-known 'bear's claw' (hogweed), and some may recognise the 'monkey's horror' (money-puzzle), which comes from Chile where it can grow up to 40 metres tall, although here in Denmark it normally only reaches about 10 metres. But have you ever heard of 'tiger's jaws' which is a succulent from the deserts of South Africa and gets its name from its sharp teeth-like leaves.

Catching your hand on a tiger's jaw is no fun. And for all you spider lovers, the Gardens are also home to a spider flower with its summer flowers with long, spindly legs that move in the breeze.

From 'animals' we move to 'fairytales' with 'dragon heads' that raise their foaming mouths in the spring in the form of 30-cm long flowers that actually stink and attract flies. The 'dragon blood tree' is a native of the Canary Islands and West Africa where it can grow to a ripe old age. If the tree is wounded, it seeps blood-red sap. This sap hardens easily, and it is said that the Knights of the Crusades brought pieces of hardened dragon's blood back with them to impress their landsmen.

Witch-hazel produces little bewitching fruits and is unique in that it flowers in various shades of yellow in the middle of winter.

Now we leave 'fairytales' to move on to 'poison ivy'. Native to North America, it was used by American Indians to lace their arrows, but it has also been used for peaceful purposes, such as to remove warts.

'Garden's plague' (creeping bellflower) can be a pestilence in any garden because it sends extremely long shoots underground in all directions.

The 'tree murderer' (oriental bittersweet) with its beautiful orange fruit, grows like a vine in the tops of other trees and strangles its host.

The 'ivy strangler' is a member of the broomrape family and makes you think of the Boston Strangler. It is a parasitic plant that does not produce chlorophyll, but lives a hidden life underground, sending only its flowers up through the ivy. There are actually only five species of broomrape in Denmark, and they are all extremely rare.

Then there is another frightening group. Everyone knows about the damnable dandelion, but we also have a 'devil in the bush' (nigella) which is an annual with tiny little devil's horns on its seed pods.

The 'devil's walking stick' (Chinese angelica tree) has long stems as thick as walking sticks and covered in sharp thorns. The 'devil tree' (false holly) is an evergreen that grows about 3 metres tall and has thorny leaves, hence its name in Danish. Its flowers actually have a lovely scent.

I have given 'Mother-in-law's sharp tongue' (snake plant) its very own group because it is debatable whether it belongs with the devilish plants or the blood-dripping plants. Regardless of its classification, however, it is an extremely hardy plant and nearly impossible to kill.

'Bluebeard' sounds ominous if you are acquainted with the story of the violent nobleman who killed all six of his wives one after the other because they were too curious. But it was a fateful day when Bluebeard married his seventh wife as he was killed by the brother of the bride.

The 'fate tree' (clerodendrum) produces extremely beautiful flowers in autumn. The common Danish name of the bush has its historical roots in the fact that it was used for a variety of medicinal purposes, but fate rather than the treatment usually determined the outcome.

And now it gets even spookier, so any children who are reading this should probably stop here. The 'blood beech' (purple beech) in our Gardens is not nearly as bloody as some of its cousins, so you have to go out into the light to see its red crown. But we have other bloody plants like the 'blood of Christ', also known as the fuchsia. Now there are only actually few species of fuchsia that can survive Danish winters, but the 'bleeding heart' (liana) has no chance outdoors in the winter as it is a native of West Africa. Its Danish name is a very precise description of the blood-red drop that peeks out of the white heart-shaped flower.

The 'dead man's finger' (blue sausage fruit) can make the hairs on the back of your neck rise if you feel the long, blue fruit on a cold autumn morning.

But let's put a lid on all this horror with the Chinese coffin tree (China fir), which can grow up to 15 metres tall in its home country. It is said that in China they plant one when a child is born and when that person's time is up again, the tree can be used for the coffin. As a perfect conclusion to this sad story, I call your attention to our weeping cypress.

The Faculty Gardens contain much more than horrors, however, so I will now leave all that is sinister behind and again allow the sun to shine on the Gardens with the 'Mexican sunflower', the classic 'sunflower' and the 'sun button' (zinnia) with their bright yellow colours and names that speak for themselves.

And now I will round off with a lovely late-summer vision of the Gardens filled with 'naked virgins' (autumn crocus), although they only last for a week or two. And when the virgins wither you can almost hear angels singing, so why not conclude with the 'angel's trumpet'.
