**The Royal Veterinary and Agricultural University in memoriam – an ode to the old university on its anniversary. By Bjarne Larsen, horticultural student**

The Royal Veterinary and Agricultural University (KVL) fell in the storm on 1 January 2007, just over 148 years old. KVL was inaugurated on 24 August 1858 as a continuation of the Veterinary School, which was founded by P.C. Abildgaard in 1773.

For about 150 years, KVL was the only agricultural university in Denmark. And it filled its role well. The old buildings stood proud and erect at the site at Frederiksberg year after year. Times changed, as things do, but the buildings remained where they were. That served them best, they thought; otherwise, old Bindesbøl would probably not have placed them there. Now and then, new buildings were added, but they were always welcomed by the old ones. For you must keep up with the times. Now and then, new rooms were fitted up in the old buildings, and the buildings watched in excitement all the things brought about by modern times. The buildings were not sorry at all, for even during the most extensive modernisation work, the old bricks did not hurt.

When the oldest building was about one hundred years old, it heard the rector talk about acquiring an experimental farm all the way out in Taastrup, and that he intended to move the farming all the way out there. But what would then become of the corn fields and the orchards at Frederiksberg, thought the oldest building. And it hurt when it saw the old apple trees, which were just as old as the old building itself, be felled. But when it heard about KVL's new orchard and vast corn fields in Taastrup, it was happy again. And it became even happier when it saw the new buildings that rapidly cropped up in the old fields. What a lot of students and scientists there would now be room for in all those lecture rooms and laboratories, it thought to itself, are there really so many young people who want to study at our old school? But there were, it soon discovered. And it was so nice during the week, when all of the old area buzzed with life, full of soul.

The main building felt it had never experienced so much soul and atmosphere before. It must be thanks to our competent management team sitting in the Senate's conference room, making all the important decisions, it thought. For the main building, which housed both the Senate's conference room and the main lecture hall, was able to follow everything that happened.

In 1977, the old forge, which was just as old as the main building, was torn down. This made the main building very sad, and it cried all night when all the people had gone home. Luckily, the anatomy building comforted the main building so much that the next day it was able to welcome all the competent scientists and students again. After all, that is the least you can do when you are a world-leading agricultural university.

One day, when the old building was standing there, enjoying the sun, the Danish government decided to merge the Danish universities. That is what they do in other countries, said the new buildings. Well, then I suppose it is necessary to keep up with times, it thought to itself. But it was a bit sad at the thought anyway. I wonder what Abildgaard would have said about a merger with the University of Copenhagen, it thought, feeling a sudden pain inside. What if they forget about me among all the great buildings at the University of Copenhagen, it thought. But when the students from the University of Copenhagen came and saw the old main building, the listed garden, the down-to-earth students and committed scientists and felt the relaxed atmosphere, they became envious and went home to their dull, grey buildings in the noisy city of Copenhagen. But they did not forget the unique study environment they had seen, the impressive Friday bar, KVL's student association, where committed students involved themselves in student politics and the barns with their cows and horses.

That was the KVL we knew and loved. The agricultural university full of life and soul, the past and the future; but most of all full of the present.

Now, the merger is a reality, the old building thought, and it almost could not wait to see what a merger actually was. But it also was a bit sad. Leif is a bit of an ordinary name, it thought.

That is what we also think. But that will not prevent us from commemorating our old friend, or from taking up the challenge with the University of Copenhagen and the Danish University of Pharmaceutical Sciences. And they should know that they have not merged with a Mr Nobody. But with our faithful friend for 150 years.

All honour to the Royal Veterinary and Agricultural University!

### Literature search consultation

This new item was created on: 13 March 2007

Get help with literature search. The library offers one free, personal consultation on how to perform literature searches in databases. In order to be accepted for a consultation, you must be an employee, PhD student, post-graduate student or BA student at KVL. A consultation lasts approx. 1 hour and is held by the library's subject specialists. In order to benefit from this offer, you must have a well-defined subject with a thoroughly reviewed formulation of a problem, and you must be able to search in Agroline and have tried to perform searches in literature databases – and possibly have attended a literature search course.

A literature search consultation comprises the following areas:

- How to define and structure a subject
- How to create a search profile for the required subject
- Which databases are relevant
- A brief introduction to search techniques in literature databases
- How to prepare and save your search profile in a database
- How to evaluate and adjust your search profile
- How to reuse your search profile in a new database

And (if desired) a brief introduction to: The library's catalogue Agroline, searching in bibliotek.dk, quotation searching in Web of Science, searching for electronic magazines, import of references using Reference Manager.

A literature search consultation is prepared on the basis of a form which you are requested to email to the subject specialist covering your subject; read about subject classification at

## European Cooperation in the field of Scientific and Technical Research (COST)

### DETAILS

COST brings together researchers and experts in different countries working on specific topics. It finances networking of nationally funded activities in supporting meetings, conferences, short-term scientific exchanges and outreach activities. COST therefore does NOT fund research itself. Currently more than 200 scientific networks (Actions) are supported. COST receives financial support for its coordinating activities from the EU RTD Framework Programme. The COST Office, administered by the European Science Foundation (ESF), acting as the implementing agent for COST, provides the scientific secretariat for COST Domains and COST Actions.

COST invites proposals for Actions contributing to the scientific, technological, economic, cultural or societal development of Europe. Proposals playing a precursor role for other European programmes and/or initiated by early-stage researchers are especially welcome. Developing stronger links amongst European researchers is crucial to building the European Research Area (ERA). COST stimulates new, innovative, interdisciplinary and broad research networks in Europe. COST activities are carried out by research teams to strengthen the foundations for building scientific excellence in Europe.

COST is organised in nine broad Domains (Biomedicine and Molecular Biosciences; Chemistry and Molecular Sciences and Technologies; Earth System Science and Environmental Management; Food and Agriculture; Forests, their Products and Services; Individuals, Society, Culture and Health; Information and Communication Technologies; Materials, Physical and Nanosciences; Transport and Urban Development). The intended coverage of each Domain is explained at [www.cost.esf.org](http://www.cost.esf.org).

Proposers are invited to locate their topic within one Domain. However, inter-disciplinary proposals not fitting readily into a single Domain are also welcome and will be assessed separately.

Proposals should include researchers from a minimum of five COST member states. Financial support in the range of EUR 100,000 p.a. for normally 4 years can be expected.

#### SUBMISSION

Proposals will be assessed in two stages. Preliminary Proposals (maximum 1,500 words/3 pages), submitted using the on-line template at [www.cost.esf.org/opencall](http://www.cost.esf.org/opencall) should provide a brief overview of the proposal and its intended impact. Proposals not conforming to the eligibility criteria of COST (e.g. requesting research funding) will be excluded.

Eligible Proposals will be assessed by the relevant Domain Committees in accordance with the published criteria at [www.cost.esf.org](http://www.cost.esf.org). Full Proposals will be peer-reviewed according to the assessment criteria at [www.cost.esf.org/opencall](http://www.cost.esf.org/opencall). The decision will normally be taken within six months of the collection date, and the Actions should expect to start within three months thereof. Approximately 75 Full Proposals will be invited for final selection of approximately 25 new Actions. Full Proposals will be invited by 11 May for submission by 27 July, with decisions expected in November.

The next event is scheduled for 22 March, 4-6 pm, in lecture hall 3-14. The theme is “New paths to plant protection” (*Nye veje for plantebeskyttelse*). Everybody is welcome.

JA is also planning to offer students events and courses in, for example, career development and stress management. These are some of the areas in which I come into the picture. JA would like to offer something that the students are interested in. If, therefore, you as a student have a fervent wish for a special event or an idea for something that JA can help with, please feel free to contact me so that I can pass on your idea. At the moment, I can be contacted both via email and phone, but plans are that I will have fixed “office hours” in future in “Vandrehallen”.
